

If the enhancements to ICMS had not occurred, it is estimated the number of carer families would have increased over 30 June 2009 levels by per approximately 70 carer families (c) Prior to 2010-11 reporting, an audit and cleansing of intervention with parental agreement records in the Integrated Client Management System (ICMS) took place. This included closing down historical records where a child was no longer subject to intervention with parental agreement. Figure 1. – Notifications and child concern reports, Queensland, 1997–98 to 2010–11





This may occur in circumstances where a family has moved and actions taken to locate them have been unsuccessful.








Figure 5 Children in out of home care, by living arrangements, states and territories, 30 June 2011
